From the Pastor's Desk:

On Wednesday, February 10, we begin the season of Lent, a season of soul-searching and repentance. It is a season for reflection and taking stock. Lent originated in the very earliest days of the Church as a preparatory time for Easter, when the faithful rededicated themselves and when converts were instructed in the faith and prepared for baptism. By observing the forty days of Lent, the individual Christian imitates Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days. Because Sunday is the day of the Resurrection, we skip over Sundays when we calculate the length of Lent.



But, the word "Lent" isn't in the Bible! Well, the word "Bible" isn't either! So what is the origin of the name? Originally, "Lent" was nothing more than the English name of the season between winter and summer, the season when the snow melts and the flowers bloom. The church observance took place during the season of lent. In England, "Lent" came to mean the observance rather than the season, leaving the season without a name. Instead of saying something odd like "Lent happens during lent", English-speaking people invented the word "spring". Today, instead of calling the seasons winter, lent, and summer, we call them winter, spring and summer. We use "Lent" instead of "spring" when we refer to the church season.

Lent has traditionally been marked by penitential prayer, fasting and almsgiving. For us, I hope it will be a time of prayer and of service to others. Let it be for us a celebration of God's marvelous redemption at Easter, and the resurrected life that we live, and hope for, as Christians.

Each year the churches in the Aberdeen/Hoquiam area join together in worship during the weeks of Lent. This year we will offer a different format from our usual luncheon worship. We have selected three dates, all Wednesday evenings, to gather for a light meal together at 5:30 pm, followed at 6:15 by table discussions. See more details about this on page 3 of this Newsletter.

Last week I received a wonderful suggestion from our lovely friend and Webmaster Tina. I would like to suggest that each of us begin using this as a Lenten devotion time. Perhaps it could continue as a daily regimen throughout the year! "It is a simple thing that each Christian can do. It's so simple, and it takes little time, but the effects are profound. Basically, everyone lives in some kind of neighborhood. While we may not know every one of our neighbors, we all know that as Christians we need God's help. So, here is the proposal: every one of us walk around our neighborhood once a day and prays for our neighbors. We may not know their names or their needs, but God does. The Bible says that when we ask, we receive. So let's do this simple thing. Hey, we'll get a little exercise, and we'll see the mighty works of God done in our neighborhoods. That's all there is to it. Thank you and God bless you." I wonder how it might affect our lives, and the lives of those around us, if each of us gave this a try! Let me know how it goes!

Stewardship Report

The good news is that we finished 2015 with all the bills, salaries and apportionments paid! The not so good news is that we ended the year \$10,000 below what had been budgeted, this in spite of a one-time special gift of \$10,000 to the General Fund. So we are looking at a significant challenge as we begin 2016.

The Finance Committee prepared a bare-bones budget for 2016, but it includes a \$2,000 "Leap of Faith" entry to try to create a balanced budget. We each have a lot of work to do to make sure that Hoquiam UMC remains a vital presence in our community.

Account balances as of December 31, 2015:

General Fund—\$2,335.29 Building Fund—\$1,648.97 Special Fund (Missions) - \$3,452.23 Parsonage Fund—\$56.79

Lowe Fund—\$44,425.58

We will be using monies from the Lowe Fund this year for some needed maintenance on both the Church and the Parsonage. The recent windstorm created additional leaks in the kitchen ceiling. We also need to address some of window framing that is rotting and complete the replacement of the broken stained glass window near the main entrance.

February 28, 3rd Sunday of Lent: I Am The Door; I Am the Good Shepherd, John 10:7-15

March 6, 4th Sunday of Lent: I Am the Light of the World, John 8:12-9:5

March 13, 5th Sunday of Lent: I Am the Way, the Truth and the Life, John 14:1-14

March 20, Palm Sunday:

March 27, Easter Sunday: I Am the Resurrection and the Life, John 11:17-27

Since there will be no Community services on Ash Wednesday or Good Friday, the Worship Planning Team will offer Noon services on these days, February 10 and March 25. We will offer a simple soup and bread lunch at Noon, followed by a short service. We will invite the communities to participate with us. Please plan to come and help host on these days.

The Gathering—PNW-RMN Annual Event:

The Gathering this year will have a different format than in the past. It will be in a Retreat setting at Lazy F Camp in Central Washington. Beginning with Registration at 9 am on Saturday, March 12, attendees will have the option of staying overnight at the camp to participate in morning prayer, breakfast, and an invitation to attend worship at Ellensburg First UMC. This is always a special event and this year's retreat format will bring a new dimension to The Gathering. Cost ranges from \$27.24 to \$67.14, depending upon whether you choose to attend only on Saturday or stay overnight, and how soon registration is received.
